

Helias Catholic High School  
Jefferson City, MO

Helias Catholic High School obtained a tuba from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in July 2016. According to Tom Smyth, Band Instructor, “We had to purchase a part from Germany and have it installed professionally to make the tuba functional. We spent around \$900.00 in repairs, but still saved \$7,850.00 including what we initially purchased the instrument for. The tuba is currently issued to a student which is helpful because otherwise the student would have to purchase their own. A high quality instrument such as this sells for \$9,000.00.”



Tightwad Fire Protection District  
Clinton, MO

Tightwad Fire Protection District obtained a John Deere ATV from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in April 2016. According to Gerald Dick, Treasurer, “We did not spend much money preparing the ATV for use. We painted it and did buy a scrap ATV and a tank from Surplus to revise the usable ATV. We use the second ATV for parts and the tank was mounted on to the usable ATV to carry water during brush fires.” The total acquisition cost on the ATV was \$9,652.00 with a service charge to the fire department of \$2,000.00. There was an additional service charge of \$250.00 for the parts ATV (which had an acquisition cost of \$11,600.00.)



Department of Transportation  
Jefferson City, MO

Missouri Department of Transportation obtained a shop set for \$4,000 in August 2016. According to Rodney Colbert, Equipment Tech Supervisor, “We use the set in our machinery shop and it works very well. We saved at least \$12,000.00 on just the one portion of boxes we have gone through, which is money that can be used to buy other tools. We appreciate Surplus keeping us in mind when they received the set into inventory.” The acquisition cost of the shop set was \$120,827.00.



Crocker R II School  
Crocker, MO

Crocker R II School obtained some aluminum, copper, and brass from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in December 2016. According to Matt Schroer, Agriculture / FFA Instructor, “We have used these material to make signs for different areas of the school. The students made a sign for the cafeteria to list specials, a concession sign for the gymnasium, signs used at the fair to show livestock. They also cut the lettering for the exterior of the new Agriculture facility. We saved approximately \$1,500.00 so far by using Surplus Property, and that is a conservative number. The materials only cost \$136 and to buy the materials somewhere else and have someone else cut the aluminum would have been extremely expensive. The students do all the cutting and are able to learn from their mistakes without it costing a lot of money.”



## USS Aries Hydrofoil Memorial Calleo, MO

USS Aries Hydrofoil Memorial is a museum along the Gasconade River. The museum obtained a boat from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in September 2016. According to BJ Meinhardt, Vice President, "It is a nice boat and everyone who has gone through it has found it interesting." Also pictured is the crane being used to lift the boat. The crane was also received from Surplus. The total acquisition cost of the boat was \$22,803.00 with a service charge of \$1,368.00.





Spickard Fire Protection District  
Spickard, MO

Spickard Fire Protection District obtained a Stewart and Stevenson Cargo Truck from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in July 2016. According to Jesse Richmond, Training Officer, “The truck works great, we take it places that a normal truck could not go. We use it as a brush truck to fight fires. We added a water tank to make it functional for our purposes and we also painted it. The tank cost \$1,300.00, and was the most expensive cost we put into the truck, after the initial purchase. The total cost put into the truck is around \$5,100.00.” The service charge for their truck was only \$3,500.00 and it had an acquisition cost of \$104,626.00.



Little River Drainage District  
Cape Girardeau, MO 63702 0159

Little River Drainage District obtained a tractor and lowboy from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in March 2016. According to Dustin Boatwright, Administrator, “We did not have to put any additional money into the truck after the purchase. We use the truck to move heavy equipment and it is able to legally haul two D 7 dozers at the same time. It has an attached wench so we are also able to pull equipment out should it becomes stuck.” According to William Boatwright, South District Foreman, “We use this two or three times per week and it is really something else. People are constantly stopping by to look at this. We are able to carry 140,000 pounds of equipment. The government acquisition on this was \$256,704.00 and we only paid \$6,500.00.”







Eleven Point Rural Fire Department  
Willow Springs, MO

Eleven Point Rural Fire Department obtained an Osh Kosh Truck from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in November 2015. According to John Mathieu, President, “We use the truck to fight brush and structure fires, it is quick and can pump off water and go get more and last all day. The only money put into this was on paint and time. I spent four and half months sanding on the truck to prepare for painting. The paint was \$150.00 per gallon so with paint and primer we spent around \$1,200.00. We paint all of our equipment red, white, and blue.” The service charge on the truck was \$7,000.00, with an acquisition of \$396,130.00. According to Frank Van Horn, Fire Chief, “Everyone in the county loves this truck and it is the best.”

Eleven Point Rural Fire Department obtained a scoop loader from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in April 2016. According to John Mathieu, President, “The loader has worked out good. It is multi purpose, we use it for city projects such as getting the field ready for the circus and carnivals. We carry rock to use in different areas. It is also used in cleanup. We had a bad storm and part of the roof on the building behind us landed on two different parts of the station. We used the scoop loader to lift up the roof and clean up. We did not put much money into the loader and what we do was more time consuming than the cost.

Eleven Point Rural Fire Department obtained a dump truck from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in April 2016. According to John Mathieu, President, “The only money we put into the truck was tires. We use the truck to haul rock out of the creek for city projects. We carried eighteen loads to do a driveway for our new station.” The truck had an acquisition cost of \$74,034.00 and Eleven Point Rural Fire Department only paid a service charge of \$5,000.00.

Alton R – 4 School  
Alton, MO

Alton R – 4 School obtained a forklift from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in June 2016. According to Jerry Granger, Transportation Director, “We had to put new drive tires, battery, and rebuild one of the cylinders. Total cost of about \$1,300.00. We use it on a daily basis. Everything from unloading trucks, to moving steel in the vo ag shop. We built a basket to go on the forks to lift people up to do maintenance work.” Alton R – 4 School paid a service charge \$2,750.00 for the forklift which has an acquisition cost of \$21,313.00.



Plattsburg Special Road District  
Plattsburg, MO

Plattsburg Special Road District obtained a 5-ton BMY dump truck from the Missouri State Agency for Surplus Property in May 2015 for a service charge of \$4,500.00. According to James Pyles, Supervisor, “This truck has been our saving grace, when the other trucks have broken down, it keeps running. It is a good truck. We use it on a daily basis to haul rock. It was a good buy. We replaced a couple parts on the truck, but other than regular maintenance we have not spent much on the truck.” If this truck was purchased anywhere other than Surplus it would have cost substantially more. Original acquisition of the truck was \$72,425.00 so the fair market value of the truck is about \$17,150.24. Thus, by obtaining this truck through MOSASP, the Road District saved \$12,650.24.
